The EBN 2006 Naples congress clearly concluded that the time for theories & academic studies was over, and that "Innovation in Action" was the name of the challenge: pragmatic, market-driven, quick & operational, committed, consistent and focused, open...

Wanted: Blue-sky and Global approaches please.

Solutions for taking Europe forward should be structural and found internally, but looking outside, at the world around, nearby or far away can provide fantastic ideas, lessons, practices, models, opportunities.... It's all about benchmarking.

Innovation is by nature an open source of knowledge. Innovation needs to be considered globally. Innovation requires bridges to flourish. It's a collective and team affair.

These are exactly the subjects we'll be talking about at the 2007 EBN-Kent Congress: building bridges to the world for benchmarking and then bridging our community of business and innovation centres on its way to the future.

A particular focus will be made on the transatlantic cooperation corridor, as the EBN-Kent congress is part of the 400th Anniversary of the founding of the first English-speaking settlement in America.

At the heart of the congress, delegates, experts and speakers will be challenged to elaborate on the future trends affecting the patterns of Business/Innovation Support Organizations, ranging from the pressure arising from a globalized economy, new emerging needs from customers, and changes in the public sector's objectives and support mechanisms

The event aims to brainstorm the evolution of the business support mission, the vision and the position of Business & Innovation Centres (BICs), Incubators and Innovation Centres.

The strategic ambition of this year's congress is, together with Europeans & non-Europeans, to build a universal road map for the BICs for the next 10 years, and to look ahead for a new generation of business & innovation centres

Canterbury – Kent, the 2007 EBN Congress Venue

The County of Kent is located in the South-Eastern part of England, characterized by its pattern of large and medium sized towns surrounded by a peopled countryside of historic market towns and traditional villages. Canterbury, the largest city in Kent, has been attracting visitors for hundreds of years, and it is the aim of the 2007 EBN Congress to continue this tradition and let the international group of delegates enjoy the so called "garden of England" and its finest countryside, cathedrals and local products.

Kent is a county of contrasts, prosperous in the west, less so in the east, divided between rural communities and urban centres. Taken as a whole, the county represents one of England's largest subregional economies. The industrial structure of the Kent economy is based upon knowledge-based business and employment. Tourism is another important economic resource for Kent: not only the county is a beautiful green space easily accessible from London, it also has many sites of international historical interest.



Kent and innovation

Kent benefits from a variety of sources of innovation, and it has been in the forefront of developing an innovation culture linking with other EU Member States. Kent has been very successful in securing European Funds for projects in the county.

Interreg I, II and III, Urban and Leader + are some of the funding programmes the county has received. The North Kent coast along the river Thames is part of the Thames Gateway, the largest area for regeneration in Northern Europe, and forming part of the "golden triangle" between London, Paris, and Brussels.

BIC Kent is also currently working with ERDF, ESF and Research Framework Programme undertaking RTD projects that serve to quantify how SMEs assimilate and respond to the ever-changing environment in which they operate. BIC Kent has been an active member of EBN Network and has been involved in many EBN led projects, such as ETI-BIC, ENTRAIN.NET and Detect-it.
